Favorite tool: An eager quilter suggested to a small group to use the Quick and Easy Block Tool. It folds out like paint chips and has 102 patterns each in five finished blocks sizes. There is a lot of resource information in the tool including fabric requirements for numbers of squares or rectangles of varying sizes. This eager quilter then "encouraged" each member of the group to make 2 blocks of a particular size and enough of each block to share with the group. They would meet at a designated time, exchange blocks and come back with a finished project. It was a great stash buster and since then a most loved tool.

Cupid's Quiltini from Quilter's Home Magazine Feb/March 2010

1 ounce Godiva original liqueur
¾ ounce premium vodka
½ ounce of raspberry liqueur

Combine Godiva liqueur, vodka, and raspberry liqueur in cocktail shaker with ice. Stir. Pour into cocktail glass.

Chocolate Truffles compliments of Eagle Brand.

I have been making this for 10 years. No wonder I look the way I do!

2 packages of Baker's Semi-Sweet Chocolate 8 squares in each package
1 can (300 ml) Eagle Brand Condensed Milk (not evaporated milk)
1 tbsp. Vanilla extract
Coatings

Melt chocolate and Eagle Brand over hot water. Stir in vanilla. Chill 2 hours or until firm. Shape into 1 inch balls; roll in any of the coatings. Chill 1 hour or until firm. Makes about 5 dozen.

Coatings: chocolate shavings, finely chopped nuts, flaked coconut, chocolate sprinkles, colouring sprinkles, unsweetened coca powder, icing sugar.

A Little History...

Log Cabin History (Fons and Porter Love of Quilting Sept/Oct. 2004)

Log Cabin quilts were a big fad in the 1860's and 70's when both the pattern and technique were new. Nineteenth century Log Cabin quilts were pieced on a foundation. Narrow strips of wool or cotton were laid atop a muslin (or paper) square, stitched down, and then pressed to one side in a technique called "press piecing". Because of their extra layer, Log Cabin quilts pieced on a foundation were often tied rather than quilted. Folklore says a red center square represents the log cabin's hearth, a yellow square the lighted window. We know this as a quilt with lots of variety!

Did you know? We shared books at the last meeting and there is a book "The Farmer's Wife Sampler Quilt". This book by Laurie Aaron Hird was published by Krause in the fall of 2009. It is always in such great demand that to own one is precious. The book comes with a CD for you can print out 101 pattern pieces. But did you know that Marti Michell has a conversion chart to show you how to use her templates to do at least 90 of these blocks. The blocks in this book look great in Civil War prints and batiks and 20's and 30's repro fabrics. How wonderful and varied is that!
